


Congratulations...

George joined the Theatre in the 70's and became lighting director, at first operating through a hole in the side wall of the stage, and then from scaffolding from the rear of the auditorium, long before we had a foyer or a Bio-Box. He also worked backstage and built many a set. Over the last few years became the handyman of Roleystone Theatre, building cupboards in the Greenroom, props area and dressing rooms. Along with many other small jobs. But his big love was the booking office, it was his domain he had selling tickets down to a fine art and made friends with many of the patrons of the Theatre who still keep in touch with me, Whenever I walk around the Theatre and see all his work, I have wonderful memories of him.

My family and I thank you from the heart for the Honour you have bestowed on George.


